- Recognize legal mandates governing and impacting peer educators
- Discuss making referrals and utilizing resources

5. Bystander Intervention as a Peer Education Technique

- Know how to be an empowered bystander
- Recognize ambivalence to responding to situations
- Manage resistance, from both friends and strangers

6. Intrapersonal Applications of Identity as a Peer Educator

- Define personal identities and manage expectations of how the world sees us
- Explore social identities and their history of social construction
- Recognize how identities impact one's development
- Discuss identity intersectionality and salience

7. Programming Strategies for Peer Educators

- Craft Learning Outcomes and objectives
- Discuss evaluating programs and presentations
- Hone skills on program presentation
- Recognize the cornerstones of successful presentations
- Recognize personal skill sets as a presenter and event planner

8. Group Development and Moving Forward

- Establish (or re-evaluate) a group set of Values, as well as Mission and Vision Statements
- Focus on the stages of group development
- Discuss characteristics and qualities of highly successful peer education groups
- Manage expectations of the peer education group moving forward
