Region I

The purpose of the Region I Snapshots is to provide insight about the Hispanic* community in higher education. We aim to provide this resource for students, professionals, and researchers interested in Latino/a's in higher education and hope that these Snapshot reports will be used as a resource regarding the changing landscape in Higher Education as it pertains to Hispanics.

The purpose of Snapshot I is to provide an overview of the Hispanic population in Region I which includes the states of Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Rhode Island, and Vermont (we have not included international entities in the Snapshots).

Snapshots II, III, IV will cover topics such as Hispanic Serving Institutions, in-state tuition benefits for undocumented residents, institutions with resource centers for Hispanics, retention and graduation rates, and policies affecting the Hispanic population in the region.

The charts below summarize Hispanic statistics in Region I for the Census years of 2000 and 2010. The data presented in the charts was collected from the U.S. Census Bureau. The numbers presented were calculated from sample populations within each of the states; therefore they are representative of the Hispanic population and have varying degrees of error.

Observations:

- The total U.S. Hispanic population increased by 3.8%.
- The total Hispanic population in Region I increased by 2.7%.
- Enrollment of Hispanic students in higher education increased by 70% between 2000-2010.
- The three states with the largest percentage increase of Hispanics enrolled in higher education were New Hampshire (151%), Maine (111%), and Rhode Island (81%).
- Massachusetts had the largest increase of students (n=19,578) enrolled in higher education between 2000-2010, followed by Connecticut (n=10,537).
- The three states with the largest percentage increase in their Hispanic population are New Hampshire (79%), Maine (76%), and Vermont (67%).
- The three states with the largest increase in their Hispanic population are Connecticut (n=158,764), Massachusetts (n=144,925), and Rhode Island (n=39,835).
- The state with the largest proportion of Hispanics (in comparison to the entire population) and the largest total Hispanic population in 2000 and 2010 is Massachusetts.
- The state with the smallest proportion of Hispanics (in comparison to the entire population) and the smallest total Hispanic population in 2000 and 2010 is Vermont.
- The three states with the largest percentage increase of Hispanics enrolled K-12 were New Hampshire (88%), Maine (67%), and Vermont (56%).
- Massachusetts had the largest increase of students (n=34,163) enrolled in K-12 between 2000-2010 followed by Connecticut (*n*=31,771).
- Hispanic student enrollment in K-12 for the states in Region I increased by 79,921 students between 2000-2010.
- All of the states in Region I with the exception of Vermont experienced a higher education growth at almost double the K-12 rate.
